Scenarios for Discussion

- 1. Ethical question: A large donor or a board member wants to give you a large sum of money, SOME of which would be used to study a question you do not feel is scientifically sound (i.e. vaccines cause autism, 3 day embryos feel pain, the earth is flat, etc.). What do you do? Do you turn down all the money? Do you accept the money and smile?
